WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE COUNTY

11 MILLION TAKE OVER DAY

On Friday 6th November 09 a team of 60 pupils from Fosse Way Primary School took on the challenge of teaching lessons, carrying out maintenance and running lunch-time as part of the '11 Million Take Over Day'. The annual event, organised by the Children's Commissioner for England, is a chance to give youngsters a say in the running of their school and ensure their opinions are taken into account. The school hoped that the children would see how the school is run and how they, as students, could help make things better. During the day the children shadowed the adult's jobs within the school including: the Caretaker, Midday Supervisors, Office staff, Headteacher, teachers and TA's. To be selected for their roles, the children had to apply for their jobs, stating why they had the right skills for the job. The children were very enthusiastic and their reasons for being given the job included: 'I'd like to take this opportunity to show how responsible I am. Secondly I believe that this is a good chance to raise my confidence for secondary school'- Ben (yr 6) and 'I would like to work in the ICT room as I can log on to the computers and spell the word password. I would look smart in a shirt and tie'. Yr 1/2 - Harry.



A group of 6 children had the opportunity to interview Andy Breckon, head of Lincolnshire School Improvement Service where they discussed the important role of education within Lincolnshire. Andy Breckon commented 'As part of the '£11 Million Takeover Day', the children of Fosse Way Primary School interviewed me about my work and the changes they wished to see. The interview was, for me, very incisive and provided a real 'users' view of schools. It demonstrated how talented the children were, being confident in everything they did and having a wonderfully positive view of the future. It was a delight to take part.'

Creativity leader and event organiser, Su France, is currently developing pupil voice within the school and saw '11 Million Take Over Day' as the ideal opportunity to raise the profile of pupil participation. She commented 'The day was a great success, with both children and adults gaining much from the challenges of swapping roles. It came at just the right time as we are currently making 'raising the child's voice in school' a focus; valuing and acting on our children's ideas for moving us forward as a school.

Since '11 Million Take Over day' some children have now had the opportunity to contribute to topic planning meetings in some year groups, so with this and other initiatives they are continuing their 'taking over' at Fosse Way!

Yarborough School — 11 Million Take Over Day

Two students from Yarborough School in Lincoln, traded places with their Headteacher on Friday 6th November as part of Take Over Day. Oliver Bird (year 10) and Oliver Philips (year 9) shadowed Headteacher, Rob Boothroyd and became involved in the day to day decisions of a Headteacher. Beginning the day with a "learning walk" provided them with the opportunity to 'drop in' on lessons and observe and talk to both the teachers and the students allowing the students to make informed decisions about the teaching practises at Yarborough School. Next came a meeting with the Assistant Headteacher responsible for curriculum to discuss aspects of this and the timetable. In the diary next was a meeting with the site manager and catering manager to discuss issues regarding the school site/building and food. During the day, a decision was made regarding where to place new LCD boards throughout the school. Rob Boothroyd said of the day, "It's very important that students feel their voices are being heard. Here at Yarborough we have a strong focus on student voice and encourage students wherever possible to share their views. Take Over Day is an ideal way to demonstrate to students that their views are taken seriously. It also provides an insight of the "behind the scenes" role involved in running a successful secondary school on a daily basis."

Participation Conference

CfBT are working in conjunction with the Participation Team at Lincolnshire County Council (lead by Colin Hopkirk) to organise a Participation and Pupil Voice Conference. The event will be **FREE** to all schools and will be held on the 27th April 2010 at the Epic Centre, Lincolnshire Show Grounds, Lincoln.

The aim of the conference is to raise the profile of pupil voice and participation within schools, showing that it can help the children feel more valued and listened to, thus impacting on their emotional health and wellbeing. We also want to showcase the good practise which exists within the county, sharing practical hints and tips. In addition, the conference will help schools to embed the Every Child matters outcome 'make a positive contribution'.

There will be two keynote speakers for the day: Barbara Hearn (OBE) Deputy Chief Executive of the National Children's Bureau and Amraz Ali, a lead inspector for Ofsted. The day will be aimed at primary, secondary and special schools with workshops available for all key stages. Workshop providers include:

Primary:

Fosse Way Primary school – Su France explains how the children have become 'change agents' in a bid to increase pupil participation and pupil voice within her school.

Fortuna Special School – Michelle Bunn talks about the positive impact of nurture groups within her school and explains how to translate this into mainstream education.

Healthy Schools – The healthy schools team will explain what their school council award is and how this can impact on pupil voice and participation within your school.

Secondary:

Successful School Council and Active Citizenship – Helen Bates from William Farr Secondary School shows a successful model for a school council, giving practical advice on how to ensure that the children fully participate and value their school council.

Traveller Education Service – Paul Boucher gives a practical demonstration on the type of curriculum traveller children are willing to engage in – a chance for secondary schools to ensure that their curriculum is inclusive and open to traveller children....

Both:

Peer Mediation – Liz Rance looks at what successful peer mediation should look like within your school – practical advice on how to set up peer mediation and how to maintain it.

Rights Respecting Schools Award - The vision behind the award is "A world fit for children, where all cultures share the values that place the well-being of young people at its heart" UNICEF. The aim of the workshop is to explore the values and accreditation process through practical activities across all school phases. Led by Helen Todd of St. Francis Special School and Liz Neale CfBT

Hemswell Cliff—Road Safety Week



During Road Safety week our JRSO's held a bright day, where lots of children came dressed to school wearing lots of bright clothes. We tested out, in our assembly, clothing we could see in the dark with only a torch light. They then talked about the clothing they could wear to keep them seen when walking to and from school.



Using the road safety resources from CFBT we used the road signs with the children in the Foundation Stage to help learn the importance of road safety. In groups we came up with rules for using our track in our outdoor area. We also used the big books from the PSHE resources and looked at the road safety rules. The children noticed that we had a black and white crossing just like in the book and used this in their play to stop at the Zebra crossing when people wanted to cross. Some children took their experiences of lollypop ladies and dressed up and used the various signs to control the traffic. Later that week we went out walking around our local area and we all were able to Stop, Look, Listen, and Think.

Relationships and Sex Education in Primary Schools

A cluster of Primary schools in Louth have decided to work collaboratively to engage Parents following the Relationships Matter training and subsequent Governor meetings and staff training in preparation for the implementation of the programme. Staff feel more confident to deliver the programme but want to involve and consult with Parents so that messages are consistent and Parents gain a better understanding of how the programme will be delivered. Gaining the support of staff, Governors and Parents is vital to the success of this sensitive area of the PSHEE curriculum which is so often inaccurately reported in the media and a chance to redress the balance is a welcome opportunity. NEWS

The British Council has just asked Lincolnshire schools to establish an area link with the Dodowa area in

Ghana where there are over 30 schools seeking a UK partner. This will build on existing good practice in many schools, also Specialist Schools and Academies initiatives involving Lincolnshire and Ghana. It will be funded through the Global School Partnership programme.

Dodowa is close to the capital, Accra, the Volta River and also the Greenwich Meridian.

The project is in its initial stages as we are yet to confirm contact with Ghana yet. However, the British Council recommends that UK schools interested in this sort of project should work in pairs, threes or quartets with a combination of primary, secondary and special schools depending on local circumstances. Ideally there should be a more experienced lead school in each cluster, which holds the Full ISA or expects to achieve it in 2010.

The Lincolnshire programme will probably start with a meeting about GSP and the formation of clusters and then an Area Linking Visit. Please send early expressions of interest to Chris Williams - crw197@gmail.com
